The CES Technical Assistance Program (TAP), funded through the New Mexico Public School Insurance Authority (NMPSIA), supported by CES provides statewide technical assistance, professional development, and compliance support to New Mexico school districts and Regional Education Cooperatives (RECs) in the focused area of special education. Over the past eleven (11) years, TAP has significantly expanded its outreach, delivery systems, and educator supports to ensure equitable access to timely, relevant, and practical guidance for special education professionals throughout the state.

Program Purpose

TAP is designed to support educators, administrators, and special education

personnel by providing high-quality technical assistance, professional development, resources, and compliance guidance that strengthen district capacity and improve outcomes for students with disabilities. TAP promotes consistent implementation of special education requirements while addressing emerging issues, best practices, and district-specific needs.

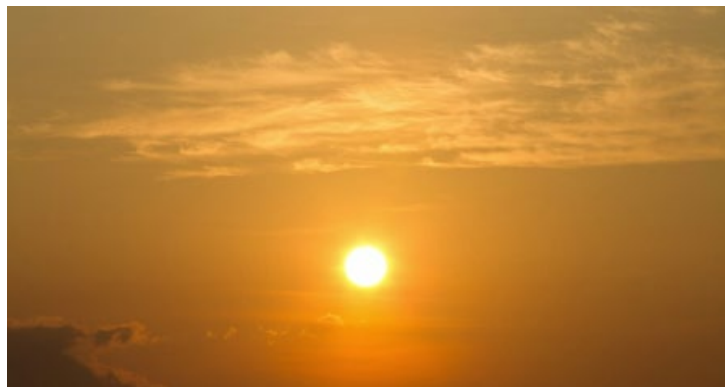

Why Should I Take Advantage of CES Cooperative Purchasing Services?

When a government or nonprofit agency purchases through a cooperative purchasing organization, the relationship creates mutual value. The agency gains access to competitively awarded contracts, procurement expertise, and administrative efficiencies, while the cooperative benefits from increased contract utilization, which helps sustain and expand the services it provides to all members. Importantly, the cooperative's success is directly tied to helping its members succeed.

Benefits to the Agency

An agency that utilizes cooperative contracts can realize numerous advantages:

- **Time savings.** The cooperative has already completed a competitive solicitation, allowing the agency to significantly reduce the time required to procure needed goods and services.
- **Regulatory compliance.** Cooperative contracts are typically awarded in accordance with

applicable procurement laws and competitive procedures, giving agencies confidence that purchases meet legal and policy requirements, subject to their own jurisdiction's rules. **CES also provides the unique added value of reviewing each purchase for compliance with the NM Procurement Code and terms of the applicable contract, unlike competing cooperatives and State Purchasing!**

- **Administrative efficiency.** Procurement staff spend less time developing specifications, advertising solicitations, evaluating proposals, and negotiating contracts, allowing them to focus on higher-value activities.
- **Best-value purchasing.** Cooperative solicitations often evaluate vendors on more than price alone, considering factors such as qualifications, technical capability, experience, warranty, service, and lifecycle costs.
- **Access to specialized contracts.** Agencies can purchase from contracts covering highly technical or specialized products and services without having to develop expertise in every procurement category.
- **Faster project delivery.** Reduced procurement timelines allow agencies to begin projects sooner, which can be especially important for construction, technology, emergency purchases, and grant-

funded initiatives with strict deadlines.

- **Reduced procurement costs.** Fewer staff hours devoted to the solicitation process translate into lower administrative costs.
- **Greater purchasing flexibility.** Agencies can often choose from multiple awarded vendors under a cooperative contract, selecting the one that best fits their specific needs while remaining within the cooperative's procurement framework.
- **Procurement support.** Many cooperatives provide contract guidance, compliance assistance, documentation, training, and customer service throughout the purchasing process.
- **No membership cost.** Many cooperatives offer membership at no cost, allowing agencies to access contracts without paying dues. **CES vendors pass along less cost in their pricing, as CES' administrative fees are lower than nearly every other cooperative!**

Benefits to the Cooperative

When agencies actively use cooperative contracts, the cooperative benefits in ways that ultimately improve services for all members:

- **Contract utilization.** Increased purchasing demonstrates that contracts are valuable and relevant to member needs.
- **Administrative funding.** Many cooperatives are funded through modest administrative fees paid by

awarded suppliers—not by the purchasing agency. **This is the CES model.** Greater contract usage generates the revenue needed to operate the cooperative.

- **Expanded contract offerings.** Sustainable funding enables the cooperative to develop additional contracts in response to evolving member needs.
- **Improved member services.** Revenue supports services such as procurement assistance, contract compliance reviews, training, legal review, vendor management, and educational resources.
- **Stronger vendor participation.** Successful contract utilization encourages high-quality vendors to compete for future solicitations, increasing competition and expanding member options.
- **Data-driven improvements.** Purchasing trends help the cooperative identify emerging needs and prioritize future procurement opportunities.
- **Long-term sustainability.** Regular contract use ensures the cooperative can continue serving its members without relying heavily on taxpayer funding or membership fees. **CES receives no taxpayer funding or membership fees, subsisting almost solely on its vendor-paid administrative fees.**

A Virtuous Cycle

The relationship between an agency and a cooperative is mutually reinforcing:

1. The cooperative competitively solicits and awards high-quality contracts.
2. Agencies use those contracts to purchase efficiently and compliantly.
3. Awarded suppliers pay an administrative fee to the cooperative based on contract sales.
4. The cooperative uses those funds to administer contracts, provide procurement support, develop new contract opportunities, and improve member services.
5. As services improve, more agencies realize value from participation, creating a stronger procurement ecosystem for all members.

This model allows member agencies to maximize the impact of limited procurement resources while enabling the cooperative to continually invest in better contracts, enhanced support, and expanded purchasing opportunities. The result is a sustainable partnership in which the agency receives efficient, compliant, best-value procurement solutions, and the cooperative gains the resources needed to continue serving effectively.

Routine and Emergency Maintenance of Facilities

CES Job Order Contracts save you time and bring consistency and stability during routine and emergency maintenance of your facilities. Our CES contractors are ready to partner with you to assist in maintaining your mechanical, electrical, plumbing, flooring, painting, fencing, and roofing systems as well as your sidewalks and parking lots. You can develop your scope of work including specifications and special conditions of service and work with our contractors on the details. Once your maintenance contract is complete and executed, you can issue a blanket purchase order to CES for the specific maintenance service you wish to be performed. CES will then issue a purchase order to the contractor of your choice.

The process for JOC services is as follows:

1. You, the member communicates the need to the contractor in a specific scope of work which includes a timeline for completion.
2. The contractor generates a cost proposal in either Gordian or RS Means and provides it to you. (YOU have choice of which contract is used for the cost proposal.)
3. You review the cost proposal to be sure it captures the scope of services you have requested.
4. Upon approval of the cost proposal, you will sign it and upload it to the CES Bluebook.

5. CES issues a CES PO to the contractor.
6. The contractor will perform the work and provide you with an invoice. You will review the invoice for accuracy, sign it, and return it to the contractor.
7. The contractor will upload the approved invoice to CES using the vendor portal.
8. CES will provide you with a CES Invoice.
9. You will pay CES.
10. CES will pay the vendor. CES pays all approved vendor invoices weekly.

Billing Note: You and the contractor may decide how often the contractor invoices you for services. It must be a minimum of one time per month for jobs that are complete. The contractor invoices may include multiple jobs but must be listed separately on the invoices. Understand that each job must have its own Gordian or RS Means proposal.

Department of Workforce Solutions Note: Any single project with a cost of \$60,000 or more (excluding NMGRT) must have a wage decision and the contractor must pay prevailing wages. (If the cost doesn't reach \$60,000 but nears it, you may wish to use a wage decision so that any change orders during the project – that would take it over \$60,000 – do not trigger retroactive wage rates.)

Payment and Performance Bond Note: Any single project with a cost of \$25,000 or more (including NMGRT) must be insured with Payment and Performance Bond.

Educational Articles, provided monthly by the CES TAP program, will resume in September.

House Bill 456, effective 6/20/2025, increased the limits for Job Order Contracting (JOC) and Architectural and Engineering (A&E) services. The single PO limit for JOC services is now \$7 million, and the single PO amount for A&E services is \$2 million. These updated limits provide more flexibility to use CES contracts for these services, so please keep CES in mind for projects within these limits. DISTRICT NEED

Amid persistent Special Education (SPED) staffing shortages districts are working to strengthen building-level expertise, elevate instructional quality, and develop sustainable leadership capacity.

CES LEAP SOLUTION

LEAP offers a sustainable solution by leveraging experienced educators already serving within district schools onto teams needing support and leadership and by driving change around Special Education licensure in our schools. Providing a differentiated pathway that allows districts to support current Level 2 and Level 3 licensed teachers in adding Special Education PK-12 NM licensure.

HOW DISTRICTS IMPLEMENT THE PATHWAY

Districts hand-select effective general educators with a Level 2 or 3 license to participate in our LEAP C8 cohort. Participants transition into Special Education site-based roles at the year start remaining anchored in district schools to further grow and support a pathway of district GYO.

DISTRICT IMPACT

CES LEAP develops building-level SPED expertise and instructional leadership within districts, strengthening and stabilizing SPED teams. The pathway refreshes the skills and instructional toolboxes of experienced educators while building internal capacity and improving continuity of services for students with disabilities.

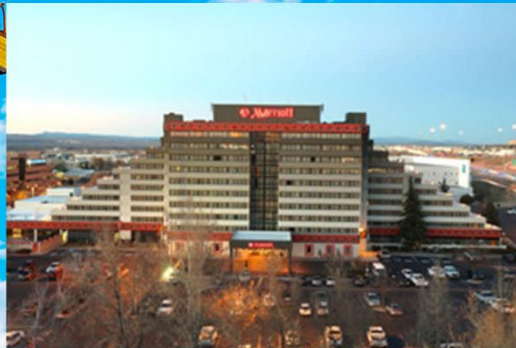
